Naloxone training for pharmacists

Naloxone saves lives!

In 2014, 384 Victorians died from drug overdose, of which 186 involved opioid analgesics and 135 involved heroin.¹ Drug overdoses in Victoria increased to almost 460 in 2016.² Naloxone is a life-saving medicine used for the treatment of opioid overdose, with minimal side-effects and no abuse potential.³

On 1 February 2016, Naloxone was rescheduled from Prescription-Only (Schedule 4) to Pharmacist-Only (Schedule 3) for use by peers, family members or carers as a first aid response to opioid overdose. Prenoxad® (Naloxone HCl 1mg/ml) is now available from wholesalers.
