

The Orange Door- Integrated Intake and Assessment for Family Violence and Child Wellbeing Supports

PRESENTATION:

The Orange Door is the new area based entry point to services which support victim survivors of family violence, perpetrators of family violence and families who need assistance with the care and wellbeing of children and young people. The Orange Door is now operational across both Inner and Outer Eastern Melbourne areas, with primary sites based in Box Hill (Inner) and Croydon (Outer).

Angie and Brendan are employed by DFFH sitting within Family Safety Victoria and have a focus in The Orange Door network on how it interacts with the broader service system, ensuring easy access and smooth referral pathways for people impacted by family violence or child wellbeing concerns. They will be joined by Orange Door Practice Leaders from partner agencies, to provide an overview of the role of The Orange Door, how integrated intake and assessment occurs through its unique multi agency model, and the types of support and connections clients and professionals can expect interacting with The Orange Door.

Prior to joining Anglicare Gennene worked for fifteen years as a counsellor with a particular focus on working with women responding to family violence.

Gennene has a Bachelor's degree in counselling, a Grad Cert in Family Violence work (women's studies) and a Grad Cert in Client Assessment and Case Management (men's family violence).

Ying has a Bachelor degree in Psychology, a Masters in Social Work and is currently completing a Grad Cert in Client Assessment and Case Management (men's family violence). Prior to joining Anglicare, Ying has worked in Community Services and Child Protection sectors supporting both children and adults. She currently works in the Anglicare Family Violence team as a Family Violence Practitioner. Her role involves intake and assessment, case management and individual delivery of the Men's Behaviour Change program. Ying has also worked as a Men's Behaviour Change program group facilitator in both Mandarin and English speaking groups.

Anglicare Victoria provides Men' Behaviour Change Programs in the Eastern region including a Mandarin-speaking group and groups run specifically for men who have Corrections orders. Individual service delivery and case management is also available where required.

As part of this role Jess provides case management support to LGBTIQ young people aged 15-25 who are experiencing or are at risk of homelessness. Jess also facilitates Talking with Pride, an arts based therapeutic group for LGBTIQ+ young people who have experienced family violence. Prior to joining FAN, Jess has worked in community engagement and has experience working with children from culturally and linguistically diverse communities, LGBTIQ+ people and young people with disabilities. Jess completed an honours degree in LGBTIQ+ community grief responses and is currently finishing her Masters of Therapeutic Arts Practice.

Jim McAlinden (he/him) – Is a specialist Family violence therapeutic Recovery Key Worker in the Anglicare Victoria Inner East TRAK Forward program, based out of Box Hill.

Jim has BSW degree in Social Work and has 40 years' experience working in both Northern Ireland (UK) and Victoria working across several community sectors such as Children Homes, residential care, Adolescent community placement (foster care) and high risk adolescent placements. Jim also worked as the first State Coordinator for the Vic Association of Young People in Care (VAYPIC) now known as CREATE, and continues to hold a strong social justice and child rights perspective. Jim has been working with Anglicare Victoria for the last 23 years across ChildFIRST, Family Services programs, and adolescent violence parents support groups.

PRESENTATION: As part of the TRAK Forward and Pathways to Resilience Outer East partnerships, Jess and Jim will give a presentation on therapeutic supports available in the inner and outer eastern regions. 
